## Students' efforts support COPE



On Friday 9<sup>th</sup> of March the sixth year students of Coláiste Iognáid, who participated in the Sleep Out, presented Marie-Anne Michel COPE Galway Community Fundraiser with a Cheque for 4091.85 euro. This was our highest figure yet, raising over 400 euro more than our previous sleep out of 2016. Over the past four years the Jes Sleep Out has raised over 12,000 euro for Cope Galway. Shane O'Halloran shares his experience - This was, both, one of the most challenging, and most eye opening experiences of my life. Growing up, I have been very fortunate to never be in fear losing one of my most basic of human rights; the right to shelter. I have grown up with a nurturing family, whom I love dearly, that have had the good fortune to be able to provide for me and my brothers. However, despite living in one of the most "developed" and richest per capita countries on Earth, there are still countless innocent people, children and adults

alike, that either live in fear of losing this most basic human right, or have had their fears come to fruition. I had opportunity to bear witness to the night-time life of some unfortunate people. Town at night is a busy place, especially on the night of the 12 pubs of Christmas. There were people running and shouting deep into the night all across town, as is the norm. What I had never considered before was the people who weren't out, but who accompanied them on Shop Street. People who slept in the doorways, in an attempt to avoid the drunken hoards, and to minimise the nip of the winter wind. Having lain all night in a sleeping bag, swallowed whole by about 4 coats, 3 base layers and a hoodie or two, no matter how many clothes you wear, the cold and wet has a way of biting like I had never experienced before. I couldn't feel warm. It was horrible. Eventually, the soaking wet sleeping bag was doing more harm than good so I decided to walk around the grounds of the church. Bleary eyed and dazed I explored an area I thought I knew like the back of my hand, but looked foreign to me at half three in the morning. But one thing struck above all else, above the cold, the drunkards or the wet. What really hit me was the boredom. We as humans crave stimulation, it's why we do most of the things we do, but being homeless, living on the streets, it strikes me as such an empty experience. It seems so lonely, as if you've been cast aside by society, as if nobody cares. Well if I didn't care before, I care now. Seeing and experiencing for one measly night what many people, not just in Ireland but around the world, experience on a regular basis, it has humbled me. I will never look at Shop Street the same way again. This experience has inspired me to help make some small difference in, at the very least, my local community. I hope to volunteer in the near future with a local organisation, COPE or one that does similar great work, and I hope many of my friends and peers who shared this experience with me will do the same.
